Project Time

- Peer-led groups work on selfchosen construction and other projects to benefit the community
- Learn to plan, budget for, and execute a project







Instructions

- Instructions are daily and given by counselors, campers, or guests
- They range in topics. They can be about world affairs, music, art, culture, athletics, ethics, etc.
- Plan and deliver your own instruction





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Other Program Areas

- Our counselors are skilled in the arts, drama, nature, music, athletics, STEM, swimming, journalism, etc.
- Over 60 acres of land to explore, including a stargazing tower, tree house, sports fields, swimming pool, and more!





Hiking

- Campers go on a multi-day hike in the Catskill mountains
- They carry everything in and out with them on their backs
- In addition, the campuses have trails for hiking







What makes us different?

- What sets us apart is our emphasis on camper leadership. Campers lead almost every aspect of our program
- Each day, a different camper leads the camp. They also lead hikes, projects, and instructions
